

Peace-Building Grants



Peace-Building Grants are designed to support events, projects or programs that foster peace in Beaverton. They can include local conflict resolution projects, community events, or trainings. Examples include providing a training for peer-mediators, books or other materials for a community discussion about restorative justice, a facilitated dialogue event on a polarizing topic or other creative ideas.

Grant objectives: (must meet one or more of the following)

- 1) Support local restorative justice or conflict resolution initiatives
- 2) Bring residents together in pursuit of a more peaceful, just, and equitable society
- 3) Promote dialogue and build stronger relationships
- 4) Provide a learning opportunity related to conflict resolution, restorative justice, or peacebuilding

Applications: Due by April 1, 2021

Award notifications: Within 4 weeks of submission

Amount available: Up to \$1,500 per project / applicant

Requirements:

- Applicant must be an individual or community-based entity with a strong connection to Beaverton e.g. *volunteer mediator/facilitator, faith-based or grassroots organizations, Beaverton student or school group, Beaverton Neighborhood Association Committees (NACs), [501(c)3 status not required]*
- Projects must benefit the Beaverton community
- Eligible expenses include materials (e.g. educational materials, printing costs) and personnel costs (e.g. honorariums)
- Grant recipients must submit a report upon completion of the project

About Beaverton Center for Mediation & Dialogue

The Center for Mediation and Dialogue (CMD) is a community program under City Services and Engagement division, serving the public since 1988 with free conflict resolution and restorative justice services and education. It is the mission of the CMD to



provide conflict resolution and community-building services to create safer, more peaceful, and inclusive communities. Services include mediation, facilitation, conflict coaching, and training and workshops. In addition, the CMD supports a restorative justice dialogue program, foreclosure avoidance mediation, and several specialty areas of mediation.

Example Budget for a Restorative Justice training

Goal: Provide multi-day programming to educate the community on restorative justice and provide a forum for discussion (approximately 25 people)

Project Expenses

The following are examples of project expenses:

- Materials/Supplies (books, packages to send to participants)
- Honorariums (speakers, facilitators, performers, etc.)
- Printing/Reproduction (flyers, banners, invitations, newsletters, etc.)

EXAMPLE

Project Expenses	Cost
Introduction to restorative justice book (25 participants)	\$300
Honorariums for presenters (\$250/person x 4)	\$1000
Training binders for each participant	\$150
TOTAL EXPENSES	\$1450
