What is a Neighborhood Association Committee (NAC)?

A NAC is a network of neighbors that identify and solve problems, educate the community on topics of interest, and complete neighborhood improvement projects. There are 11 formally recognized NACs and everyone that lives, owns property, or represents a business, school, or non-profit is a member.

What is the Neighborhood Matching Grant Program?

The Neighborhood Matching Grant Program was established in 1995 by the City of Beaverton. Neighborhood Matching Grants (\$2,000 or less per project) support a variety of neighborhood enhancement projects & events. Each dollar applied for must be matched with a dollar of volunteer time, cash, and/or in-kind donations.

Who is eligible to apply for a Matching Grant?

Grants are given to the city's NACs but other community organizations and individuals are encouraged to partner with the NACs on projects of mutual interest. Funds must be used for projects that have a direct public benefit within the NAC.



Where can I find the application?

Grant applications are available on the city's website at www.BeavertonOregon.gov/NACGrant or you can pick one up from the Neighborhood Program Office at Beaverton City Hall.



Applying for a Matching Grant in Four Easy Steps

1. Present the idea at your Neighborhood Association Committee (NAC) meeting.

The idea can be a well developed plan or it can be a general idea!

2. Complete an application form.

The steps to creating a successful project include selecting a project and setting its scope, researching regulations, determining resources needed, & developing a budget. The Neighborhood Program can help you prepare the application, although the project idea and research must originate with you.

3. Work with the sponsoring NAC on the proposal.

A NAC officer (Chair, Vice-Chair, Treasurer, or Recorder) will need to sign the application but anyone can lead the project.

4. Submit the completed application to the Neighborhood Program before the deadline.

Deadlines are the last Friday of July, Sep., Nov., Jan., and Mar.
